#### This Week in Worship ...with Pastor Patricia

This week, we will be honouring our oneness in Christ and with all our Christian family around the world as we celebrate World Communion Sunday.





Every year, it takes place on the first Sunday of the month to promote Christian unity and the concept of ecumenical cooperation, which encourages all Christians to develop loving connections.

This tradition was started in 1933 by Hugh Thomson Kerr, former minister of the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in the United States. In 1936, it was adopted throughout the US Presbyterian Church, and four years later, the National Council of Churches endorsed the holiday. Today, World Communion Sunday is observed by Christian churches worldwide.

#### Apostle Paul's words in Ephesians 4:3-5: (NIV)

Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

This Sunday, we join others around the world as we remember in word, song, and action that Christ has one body, spread though it may be across denominations.

# And something to think about as we enjoy fellowship following our service...





Sanctuary's main tool, <u>The Sanctuary Course</u>, is used in 80 countries by over 250,000 people. Developed in consultation with mental health professionals, theologians, and people with lived experience, this eight-session study guide explores key mental health topics and examines meaningful ways to offer companionship, support recovery, and promote well-being.
